- Project plan attached with start & end dates included
- All requirements met and supporting evidence provided

Worser Bay Boating Club

This initiative aims to provide a 'Have a Go' at dinghy sailing experience to a number of primary schools in the area surrounding Worser Bay Boating Club and a more extensive introductory sailing experience to secondary school pupils at Wellington High School. Primary school children will receive half day on the water sailing in optimist yachts, targeting (n360 children) and secondary school students will receive half day sailing experience in the more advanced sunburst yachts (n50children).



Hoop Club Hutt Valley

This basketball specific initiative will deliver a 'Back to Basics' and 'Coaching the Coaches' programme which will directly impact 690 children, 8 schools and 12 local coaches in the Hutt Valley region. The programme will take place over an 8-10 weeks or school term (before school & during lunch-time).



YMCA Wellington

'Y-Sport 4 Kids' is an initiative aimed at increasing participation of primary and intermediate children in sport at the grassroots level. This will be done by providing in-school coaching sessions, an after-school 'Y-Sport 4 Kids' league, and linking RSO's and sports clubs (targeting n360 children league and n1500 children coaching programme).



Tennis Central

Tennis Central has received KiwiSport funding to provide the 'Grasshopper' tennis programme to 13,500 children across the greater Wellington region over the next three years. Grasshoppers provides the fundamental skills and pathways required to encourage kids into a sport that they can play for life.



Cricket Wellington

Cricket Wellington aims to address the shortage of cricket coaches via a 'College Cricket Coaching Academy'. The project intends to recruit, train and provide support to approximately 140 year 11 & 12 students who will then coach at a junior level, either at their college or at a local junior cricket club.



Wellington KiwiSport Contestable Fund

Otaki College

This unique initiative intends to provide speed, agility and quickness (SAQ) training to 450 primary and secondary school students as well as providing a SAQ coaching programme to targeted sport clubs (30 sports coaches) and all local Otaki schools (18 teachers). Otaki College aims to provide a high quality training programme for current, aspiring and high performing students and athletes within Otaki.

Ignite Sport

Ontrack is a sports academy programme for intermediate and secondary school aged students which uses the power of sport to engage, motivate and inspire young people to maximize their full potential both on and off the playing field. Ontrack uses a range of sport and life skill development activities, designed to get students participating in sport. Target: n120 secondary and intermediate students, either not currently engaged in sport, or at the risk of dropping out.

Wellington Rugby League

The Leadership Thought League initiative is targeted at engaging secondary school students into a coaching and development academy programme in order to grow young leaders and the game of league among youth. 120 WRL Senior Sports Leaders selected from 6 local secondary schools will complete an NCEA Level 1-3 Coaching Certificate and Rugby League Development programme. In addition, WRL Senior Sports Leaders will assist in the deliver of a 5-week flag league programme to 36 primary schools and a one day league tournament (n200+ children), and have the opportunity of being an assistant coach during the Stephen Kearney Cup.

Hoop Club Wellington

Through Hoop Club Wellington, 12 schools will receive 1x 60 minute 'Back to Basic's sessions each week for 8 weeks, at the same time a recruitment drive will be underway in schools identifying aspiring coaches, who once recruited, will begin their own training, learning to become a coach. A key feature of this initiative is the 'Getting Started' coach training programme for teachers which mean personnel within a school may continue providing a good level of basketball on site once the Hoop Club programme has been completed.

Touch New Zealand

Turbo Touch™ is a new game developed by Touch New Zealand that will be delivered to 15 schools (n2,250 children) across the Wellington region. Turbo Touch™ is a fast paced indoor/outdoor game combining elements of Touch, Netball, Basketball and Ultimate Frisbee. Through Turbo Touch™, five classes from each participating school will receive 4x 60 minute Turbo Touch™ sessions; in addition 65 teachers will receive Turbo Touch™ training and 4x Turbo Touch™ holiday programmes will be held at the end of term 1 and term 2 2011 (n480 children).

Fundament Movement Skills Project

Hutt City Council (via Leisure Active) will lead the delivery of a pilot Fundamental Movement Skills Project in the Hutt Valley region which will see approximately 12,000 (year 1—year 6) primary school children develop and enhance key aquatic, movement and manipulative skills.



Strengthening Secondary Schools Sports Project

This initiative led by College Sport Wellington aims to provide new sporting opportunities for secondary school students, through partnerships with four sports namely Table Tennis, Futsal, Handball and Bowls (and their respective clubs, RSO and NSO) with the aim of increasing participation and new participants to those sports. A project milestone is to have over 1,500 students participating in these sports, with ideally half being new to the sport. College Sport Wellington will provide the vital link required between sport and secondary schools.



Student Sport Transition Project

Lead by Upper Hutt City Council, this pilot initiative aims to provide information, training, support and facilitate connections to develop a seamless transition (and participation) in sport through and beyond school. The project aims to achieve the following outcomes:

- More teenagers staying in sport after they leave secondary school
- More intermediate aged school children staying in sport when they transition to secondary school
- More young people developing a love of sport and gaining lifelong participation in sport
- Improve the skills and capability to deliver grassroots sports to young people by schools, clubs and recreation organisations



Primary Sport Wellington Expansion

The aim of this project is to provide all areas of the Wellington Region with consistent, high quality coordination for school sports. This would provide schools with a sports coordination service that will deliver: High quality events; Increased opportunities for children to participate in sporting activities; Increased skill development for children and teachers; professional development for schools in physical education; sustainable event management and security of event management should a coordinator be unavailable.



Wellington KiwiSport Non-Contestable Fund

Secondary School Sports Coordinators

A change to funding allocations has negatively impacted the ability of some schools to support sports coordinators.

SPARC recognises that sports coordinators can play a vital role in achieving the objectives of KiwiSport. In light of this, Sport Wellington has given priority to investing in secondary schools that wish to retain sports coordinators to ensure secondary schools are not disadvantaged by the change in funding allocations. To date, eight out of twelve eligible secondary schools have received KiwiSport funding.



Grasshoppers KiwiSport Tennis Hits Kapiti

Grasshoppers Tennis Causes a Racquet On The Coast

Thanks to Tennis Coach Jamie Atkinson, 87 children ranging in age from 5 – 11 years participated in a Grasshoppers tournament held in excellent conditions at the Paraparaumu Beach Tennis Club. Grasshoppers is a Tennis New Zealand initiative endorsed by SPARC which is delivered in schools throughout the country. Paraparaumu Beach School, Kena Kena School, Paraparaumu School and Raumati Beach School are all involved in the Grasshoppers programme on the Kapiti Coast, a total of 1,173 pupils.



Grasshoppers is designed to be delivered within the school's physical education curriculum, and focuses on developing each child's basic movement, striking and coordination skills through a fun games-based approach using modified equipment. Both Paraparaumu School and Raumati Beach School have been able to become involved with the Grasshoppers programme this year through KiwiSport funding provided by Sport Wellington. This funding greatly reduces the costs of the programme for schools and provides tennis equipment for the schools at no cost.

A key component of Grasshoppers is linking the programme delivered in schools into the local club. "It is important that kids have the opportunity to go along to the club and feel comfortable, hence going along to a tournament with their school friends and with the coach or coaches that have delivered the programme creates a natural and comfortable link for the kids" Jamie says. Figures from Tennis New Zealand for the 2009/10 season suggest that almost 10% of Grasshopper children from the schools programme have progressed to a local club for coaching and membership.

Mike Ryan, Tennis Central Regional Development Manager said, "Our aim is to make tennis accessible to all and to encourage children into a game they can play for life; the Grasshoppers programme in schools is helping to achieve this and the club tournament helps in ensuring there is a pathway in place into a local club for children to continue to develop and improve."

Kids Dribbling for Basketball

Slam-dunk for Back to Basics Basketball Programme

Wainuiomata school kids are benefitting from a Government initiative designed to see its young participants get active and develop sports skills.

More than a dozen Wainuiomata Intermediate pupils stuck around after school as Terry Stallworth coached them through an array of dribbling and shooting techniques as part of a basketball development programme funded by KiwiSport through Sport Wellington.

Mr Stallworth is a member of the Wellington-based Hoop Club, one of five projects in the Wellington region to receive funding out of the 17 first-up applications of the KiwiSport Regional Partnership Fund. The \$37 million fund was launched by the Government in August 2009 as a way of encouraging schools to work with clubs and community organisations to get more children involved in sport.

This funding has allowed Hoop Club Hutt Valley to run a series of after school basketball development programmes at nine schools around the Hutt Valley. Mr Stallworth, a former pro-basketballer, runs two of the 10 week programmes at Wainuiomata Intermediate and Fernlea School. "This is to help them develop basketball skills for competition at the Walter Nash Stadium," he says. "When kids play in miniball leagues their skills are better." Mr Stallworth says the spin-offs of getting children involved in sport are that it gets kids out of the house and keeps them active.



Hoop Club is well-known for its effectiveness in developing brilliant young basketballers. Six members of the club have represented New Zealand in the under 13 to 19 level, while Tall Black Craig Bradshaw is one of its alumni.

Viard Kids Ontrack To Win

Students benefit from opportunities to enhance sporting potential

Over 150 Bishop Viard College students completed the Ontrack Sports Academy programme funded by KiwiSport through Sport Wellington, with coaching provided by Steve Willis, brother of Olympian Nick Willis.

The programme, run by the Lower Hutt based Ignite Sport in term four 2010, was offered to every Year 7 and 8 class, along with selected Year 9 to 11 students. There was specific coaching across a range of fundamental sports skills as well as sessions on goal setting, mental skill training, sport leadership, barriers to success, and developing character.

Steve Willis coached his brother to the bronze medal (later upgraded to silver) at the Beijing Olympics in 2008. "The aim of the Ontrack programme is to motivate and support students with sporting ability to make the most of their gifts. Many athletes have talent but often lack the opportunity to reach their potential."

Along with athletics, there were specialists from cricket, ultimate frisbee and volleyball, and trainers from within Porirua. Students each had their own work book and were encouraged to set goals for their sporting future. Bishop Viard PE teacher Karl McLennan said the Ontrack initiative worked comfortably alongside their regular PE curriculum.

“The Ignite Sport team has positively enhanced our PE and sports programme by developing the students’ knowledge and understanding of being a well-rounded sports person. Students have been able to identify ways in which all aspects of their lives can affect their performance and ability to reach their sporting goals.”
